Statement of Accountability & Land Acknowledgement

The healthcare system as we know it today is the history of colonialism.

Gender-affirming healthcare is not immune to the impacts of colonialism and it works as part of the larger eurocentric system to privilege certain understandings of gender over others. Many Indigenous groups understand one's relationship to gender to come from spirit-based teaching. Many Indigenous communities honored and respected Two-spirit folks for who they are and it was not uncommon for Two-spirit folks to hold important roles within their community, such as protectors, Chiefs, medicine people, and more.

We share this information with you today to acknowledge and honour Indigenous worldviews that are not often centered in discussions on gender and healthcare due to historical and ongoing colonial violence.

We recognize that we are all living off the **stolen** ancestral lands of Indigenous peoples for thousands of years.

We understand that the island of Ktaqmkuk (Newfoundland) is the unceded territory of the Beothuk and the Mi'kmaq peoples, and Labrador is the ancestral homelands of the Innu of Nitassinan, the Inuit of Nunatsiavut, and the Inuit of NunatuKavut.

Defining what is...

Gender-Affirming Care (GAC)

Any item, procedure, or service (medical and non-medical) that aids in aligning an individual's body or physical presentation with their identified gender.



Some Examples of GAC

- Changing one's legal name and/or sex marker
- Access to items such as wigs, makeup, etc.
- Body contouring (breast augmentation, breast reduction, liposuction, mastectomy, etc.)
- Hair removal (waxing, electrolysis, etc.)
- Hormone replacement therapy (HRT)
- Speech therapy



How to...

Access GAC within the province

Connecting with a healthcare professional (family doctor, nurse practitioner, internist, etc.)

Referral to physician with trans and gender diverse health specialization



Accessing...

Hormone Replacement Therapy (HRT)




- Puberty blockers (gonadotropin-release hormone [GnRH] agonists)
- Testosterone
- Progestins
- Androgen blockers
- Estrogen
- Progesterone

Although all family doctors can technically prescribe HRT, in most cases they decline to prescribe HRT due to an identified lack of specialization or knowledge in the area.

Accessing...

Gender-Affirming Surgeries



A prior approval package must be submitted to MCP, which includes:

- Patient Information Sheet (completed by patient)
- Clinical Eligibility for Transition-Related Surgery form (completed by physician or nurse practitioner)
- One or two Surgical Readiness Assessments (completed by a certified Surgical Readiness Assessor)
- One or two signed certification and recommendation from the Surgical Readiness Assessor




Accessing...

Gender-Affirming Surgeries

If approved by MCP, a referral and the MCP letter of approval is then submitted to the approved surgeon or facility. The facility or surgeon would then contact the individual to arrange a consultation.

An individual is required to wait 6months following MCP's approval before they are able to access surgery with coverage.



General Criteria for Approval

- Patient must receive approval from MCP prior to surgery
- Patient must be a resident of Newfoundland and Labrador
- Patient must have a valid MCP health care card
- The surgical facility/surgeon must be approved by MCP



Clinical Eligibility for Prior Approval

- · Persistent, well-documented gender dysphoria
- Capacity to make fully informed decisions and to consent for treatment
- Reasonably well-controlled medical or mental health concerns, if present
- Aftercare/follow-up plan
- Patient is physically healthy
- Patient has realistic goals and expectations of surgery
- Patient has adequate support network
- · Gender identity of individual has remained stable over time
- Patient has regular visits with a health care provider
- Patient is engaged in a responsible way with the assessment/treatment process

Criteria for MCP coverage are based on guidelines published by the World Professional Association for Transgender Health (WPATH)

What is Covered by Provincial Healthcare...

Upper body surgery (Top surgery)

- Breast augmentation (when there is breast aplasia after 12 continuous months of hormone therapy)
- Mastectomy with chest masculinization (excluding implants and liposuction, which are not covered)

Genital surgery (Bottom surgery)

- Hysterectomy removal of the uterus
- Orchiectomy removal of the gonads (testes) and spermatic cord
- Salpingo-oophorectomy removal of the fallopian tubes and ovaries



Genital reconstruction

- Vaginoplasty
 - Penectomy surgery to remove part or all of the penis
 - Labiaplasty surgery to reduce the size of the labia (minora and majora)
 - Clitoroplasty reduce the external part of the clitoris
- Metoidioplasty use of local tissue to create a smaller phallus
- Phalloplasty
 - Urethroplasty surgery to repair the urethra
 - Scrotoplasty surgery that repairs or creates a scrotum
 - Vaginectomy removal of all or part of the vagina
 - Insertion of testicular and approved penile implants



What is **Not** Covered by Provincial Healthcare...



- Facial surgery (feminization & masculinization)
- Body contouring (liposuction, fat transfer, shoulder reduction, etc.)
- Tracheal shave
- Hair removal or transplant (electrolysis, laser hair removal, transplant)
- Voice training
- Vocal surgery (laryngeal lengthening and shortening)
- Non-flat top surgery
- Travel, accommodations, and transportation



Gender Inclusive Sexual & Reproductive Healthcare

Inclusive intake form(s)

Ensuring the physical space is affirming & accessible

Train all clinic staff (clinicians, admin, etc.) on gender inclusivity and trans & gender diverse health needs

Use of chosen name and pronouns

Use of anatomy-based terms opposed to gendered terminology

Use of an "organ inventory" document to ensure appropriate health screenings are received



Examples of Anatomy-based Terminology

Try	Instead of
Upper body	Breast / Chest
Erogenous or erectile tissue / External genitals / Genitals	Penis
Erogenous or erectile tissue	Clitoris
External genital area	Vulva
Opening of the genitals	Introitus / Opening of the Vagina
Internal genitals / Genitals	Vagina
External gonads	Testes / Testicles
Internal gonads	Ovaries
Internal reproductive organs	Female reproductive organs

Gender Inclusive Sexual & Reproductive Healthcare

Some unique considerations...



- Impact of HRT and gender-affirming surgery on sexual desire & function
- Medication for the cessation of menstruation
- Contraception information
 - HRT should <u>not</u> be used as a form of contraception
- Pregnancy for trans and gender diverse folks
- Impact of HRT and gender-affirming surgery on reproductive functioning
- Experiences with gynecologic pain, disease, etc.

- Trans friendly sexually transmitted and blood borne infection testing on spot
- Blood work for folks on hormones
- Pap testing for anyone with a cervix
- Vaccines for HepB, HPV, and Mpox
- Treatment for Hep C
- Vein maintenance for folks who use substances
- Insert IUDs and nexplanon
- Supplies for injecting hormones
- Injection/use training



- Accessibility Considerations:
 - Masks requiredAccessible parking
 - Wide entrances
 - · Ramps available



Pediatric & Adolescent Gynecology Clinic Janeway Children's Hospital - Eastern Health

Key Features:

- New clinic with a doctor (Dr. Maria Kielly) who specializes in adolescent gynecology and is transfriendly
- Doctor also sees adult gynecology patients and obstetrical patients
- Assists with menstrual suppression
- Supports folks with planning for/doing gender hysterectomies
- Provides assistance with vaginoplasty concerns
- Unable to offer hormone starts yet but hoping to add this in the future

- Wheelchair accessible bathroom and clinic rooms


